


The pitter patter of little feet (volubly matched with the jibber jabber of little tongues) can be heard loud and clear at Sethu's Child Development and Family Guidance Centre. Sethu is a place where children from birth to 19 years (and occasionally, beyond) and their families can find help for various concerns related to their development, emotions, behaviour and learning. From 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2016, a total of 1055 children and families were assessed and supported. 671 children and families were newly registered, while 384 were families registered previously, who came for follow-up this year.

The breakdown looks like this:

GENDER Boys: 728 (70%), Girls: 315 (30%)

AGE The vast majority of children who visit Sethu are under-fives, which makes us perfectly placed to institute early intervention. During 2015-16, a total of 492 children from 0-5 years were seen, which amounts to 47% of all the 1043 child clients. There are 3 main reasons for early referral to Sethu - high levels of parental awareness, competent paediatricians and vigilant preschool teachers. Our strong web of networks with families, doctors and schools ensure that the children who are identified by these three agencies are brought to Sethu for early assessment, diagnosis and treatment, all of which are enabled through exceptional teamwork. In addition, there is nothing quite like word-of-mouth to get Sethu noticed.





DINESH'S STORY

6 year old Dinesh struggled to concentrate, follow instructions, sit in place and write. However he loved books and reading. The occupational therapist at Sethu identified that Dinesh had poor body awareness, difficulties with motor planning (the ability to complete a series of actions) and a lack of co-ordination of both sides of the body.

He started regular occupational therapy at Sethu and also followed a home program, where he had fun pushing and pulling objects to improve body awareness. Jumping jacks, skipping, marching and bouncing a ball with alternate hands enhanced his coordination and lots of creative art and craft activities strengthened the small muscles of his hands. Sethu staff visited his school to offer information, support and educational plans.

Within 3 months, Dinesh lost his aversion to pencils and became more talkative and confident. When the family, school and therapy centre form a team around the child, better understanding and steady progress are a certainty.



ACADEMIC ASSESSMENT FOR LEARNING DIFFICULTIES



Scholastic failure is a common reason for referral to Sethu, where children undergo psycho-educational testing to determine the causes of their academic difficulties. Assessment tools that are appropriate to the student and educational setting in Goa are administered, using Curriculum Based Assessments (CBA).

Reading assessments are performed using passages taken from the school English textbook, which are adapted in length and content to enable meaning-making. The assessment focus is on decoding (accuracy and fluency in deciphering high frequency regular and irregular words), oral language and reading comprehension (ability to retell the passage in the child's own words and respond to explicit, implicit and inferential questions about the passage). Spelling is evaluated with dictation words from the graded Fry Word lists, which consist of the most frequently used words in reading and writing. To ascertain competence in mathematics, where the understanding of various concepts is sequentially built, the student is given sums from his present standard, as well as from two standards lower. For example a student from Std. 7 is given sums from Std. 5, 6 and 7. Writing ability is assessed by asking the child to write a few sentences on a topic of interest to that age group (i.e. My Favourite Game) or pen a short story based on a picture prompt.

Testing material for CBA can be prepared quite readily, children accept it well, the child's current level can be determined and teachers can plan remedial measures accordingly. The next logical step would be to train teachers to incorporate this assessment method in schools and to conduct research into its applicability as an appropriate tool both to diagnose, as well as remediate learning difficulties in Goa.

Autism spectrum disorder, which affects around 1 in 68 children, is characterised by difficulties in communication, socialisation, as well as restricted and repetitive behaviour. Sethu has been dedicated to empowering families and training teachers to manage children with autism in homes and classrooms. Sethu also strives to raise public awareness about autism and its effects on individuals, families and the society. We believe that by working with the whole community of carers of children with autism, we can endeavour to put together a sturdy system of support to promote their development and learning.

During 2015-16, Sethu helped 287 families of children with autism through therapy and training. We have done so in 4 main ways:-

1. AUTISM INTERVENTION Families of children diagnosed with autism right from infancy to the teenage years come regularly for intervention sessions to Sethu. Be it for behaviour management, teaching daily living skills, improving communication or remedial education, we are committed to providing the best practices to the children who visit us. Our therapists are encouraged to attend regular training programmes in autism intervention, especially from experts in the field from India and abroad. This year, Andre Velho, our behaviour therapist, enrolled in a 6 month Autism Intervention Training Programme created by Ummeed Child Development Centre in Mumbai. The new learning gained from the excellent team at Ummeed has taken our autism intervention to a higher level.

2. PARENT-TODDLER EARLY INTERVENTION It is widely known that early intervention results in the best outcomes for children on the autism spectrum and with this aim in mind Sethu conducts Asha, a parent-toddler early intervention programme, over 12 weeks. This unique programme in Goa empowers parents of newly diagnosed children with autism in improving their children's core difficulties in communication, socialisation, challenging behaviours and motor skills development. This year, 3 sessions of Asha took place at which 19 children were helped. So far, Sethu has empowered over 30 families in supporting their children at a crucial young age. All children who attended Asha showed a reduction in autism symptoms on the Autism Treatment Evaluation Checklist (ATEC) after completing the programme. We are very grateful to Groupe Missions, Switzerland, for organising a bake sale to raise funds for Asha.



3. AUTISM TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR FAMILIES Families are the most

important part of autism intervention since all the time they spend with their children is an opportunity to help them improve! All parents and caregivers of children newly diagnosed with autism are encouraged to attend 'Aarambh', a training programme designed specifically for families. 19 families were trained over 3 sessions of Aarambh this year on topics such as visual supports, behaviour management, sensory integration, play and communication.

4. SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING FOR TEENAGERS WITH AUTISM Definitely a

first-of-its-kind in Goa, and possibly in India, 2015-16 saw the birth of PEERS (Programme for the Evaluation and Enrichment of Relational Skills). The focus of PEERS is to improve the social skills of teens with autism - to help them make and keep friends. In 2014, Andre Velho attended the PEERS training programme in New Delhi, conducted by the University of California, Los Angeles and organised by Action for Autism, New Delhi. Originally a 14 week programme, it was modified to be held over 10 weeks so as to make it convenient to parents, increase participation and reduce drop-out. The teens learnt how to have a conversation, use humour appropriately, deal with bullying and use social media. 4 teens and their parents greatly benefited from PEERS as demonstrated on 2 outcome measures - the TASK (Test of Adolescent Social Skills) and the SRS (Social Responsiveness Scale). We are eager to start the next PEERS programme in September 2016.



For the team at Sethu, inclusive education is a right, as well as a professional responsibility that we take very personally.

TARANG

Sethu's preschool inclusive education programme, called Tarang, first started as a resource room for children with developmental disabilities within Chubby Cheeks School. However, this model could not be replicated as it was implemented by highly trained professionals who are very difficult to sustain in the meagre-salary environment of regular preschools. Hence in 2015, Sethu shifted tack and Tarang evolved into an itinerant teaching model. Patricia Lopes, our preschool educator travels to different schools, offers hands-on teaching and facilitates consultation and training.

During 2015-16, Tarang was offered to Nisha's Play School, one of Goa's most sought after preschools. Five children received support in different curricular activities and behaviour management. All the teachers were given an orientation on inclusion and the Tarang programme was highly appreciated by the Principal and staff of the school. We learned the importance of finding ways to promote inclusion, in situations as diverse as riding on the school bus to participating in art activities. We are grateful to Nisha da Cunha and her teachers, our fellow travellers on this voyage of discovery. The Tarang programme will continue in Nisha's Play School and go to other schools during the academic year 2016-17. We have developed an Index for Excellence in Inclusion to evaluate and strengthen inclusive practices in preschools.

GNYANDEEP

2015-16 has been a challenging yet enlightening year for Gnyandeep our preschool teacher training programme, as we decided to go down the road less travelled. The hard-knock experiences of 10 years have taught us that to reach pre-schoolers most in need, we have to work with the Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), the world's largest Government program for maternal and child health. We trained 26 balwadi teachers from all 12 talukas in Goa with a focus on facilitating inclusion in anganwadis. Teachers


were provided with the Early Learning Kit from the Centre for Learning Resources (CLR), Pune, which aids cognitive, language, numeracy and literacy skill development. Case studies helped us gauge their understanding and application of what the teachers learnt. It was heartening to hear that the teachers found the training very practical and relevant. The training phase of the project is being followed by on-site visits to each of the balwadis. We will traverse the length and breadth of Goa to observe our trained teachers apply their new knowledge and continue to refine this model. Watching the teachers and their helpers interact with the children through dance, songs, conversations and stories has left us in admiration. Their patience, connection with the children and innovation in using scarce materials is laudable. However, we are also disturbed that many anganwadis are located in inadequate spaces that lack ventilation or sanitation and are trying to find ways to change this. We look ahead as the torch of inclusive education reaches remote parts of Goa through the Gnyandeep project. We are grateful for the logistic support provided by the Directorate of Women and Child Development and the financial backing of the Rotary Club, Panjim and Cipla Foundation.



ENGLISH IS FUN

Teaching in a Govt. Primary School (GPS) is a joyful experience. Unfortunately, across the state, enrolment figures in these institutions have been falling and the same sad reality is seen at GPS Paithona too, where the English is Fun project is being implemented. In 2009 when the programme started, there were 23 children, a figure that has dwindled to a meagre 14 in 2015. As private schools receive Government aid and are able to provide buses, better facilities and long term continuity from primary to high school, parents prefer this option. Fortunately the falling numbers have not dampened the spirits of the teachers

and children. This year we explored many exciting books and much of the focus was on animals and nature. This opened the doors to a lot of sharing, acting, sound making, drawing, reading and writing. The learning was reinforced by a school field trip to Bondla Zoo. GPS Paithona is a multi-lingual classroom where Hindi, Konkani, English and Marathi are used. The levels of comprehension and spoken vocabulary in English have greatly increased. Several children in Std 4 are able to read simple sentences. However, this is nowhere close to the level that is expected when they move to an English medium school in Std 5. We hope the newly appointed English teachers in the GPS network across Goa will receive appropriate training and help fill the gap in teaching English as a second language to their bright and enthusiastic students.





Sethu's train-ing programme chugs along at a steady speed. 20 workshops and lectures were conducted during this year for parents, teachers, special educators, doctors, Heads of schools, caregivers in institutional homes, resource persons of SSA, anganwadi teachers, supervisors and project officers of ICDS.



After completing a decade, to avoid stagnation, burnout or collapse and to effectively meet the ever-increasing demands on our service, we have taken major transformational administrative decisions by increasing our staff, improving remuneration to sustain our highly qualified team, doing more outreach work, investing in better systems for organisational management such as biometrics and actively fundraising to purchase land for a permanent Sethu centre. An important activity of this year was to develop a strategic plan for the next year, with the help of Dave MacDonald, who has worked with the WHO, as well as smaller organisations. We have rolled up our sleeves to meet our 5 big goals for 2016-17.

CHILD PROTECTION POLICY FOR SETHU

Sethu has a strong belief in child protection and wants to provide a respectful and safe environment while ensuring the children that Sethu is responsible for do not come to avoidable harm. Children with disabilities are more vulnerable to child abuse and hence Sethu is very concerned that every child who seeks its services is assured of safety. As Sethu lacks a written child protection policy at present, steps have been taken to correct this deficit, with the assistance of The Karl Kubel Foundation, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu who are conducting a 3-module training on child protection. After attending module I in March 2016, a team has been formed at Sethu to work on a comprehensive written child protection policy, led by Silvia Mascarenhas. The first draft will be ready by September 2016.



- 1. A home for Sethu within 10 kms of Panaji—this could be a plot of land around 1000m² or an independent house of at least 600m², with parking and access to public transport.
